


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West Virginia Coal 2020 and Beyond: Recovery and Rebuild

2020 presented unprecedented challenges as more traditional markets eroded, the world economy slowed and mining operations struggled to overcome the complexities and disruptions of the COVID-19 pandemic. The net effect was West Virginia coal recording its lowest output in over 100 years.

The pandemic may have slowed us down a little, but even at our reduced profile, the coal industry yielded unparalleled contributions to West Virginia communities, local and statewide economies.

In 2020, more than 2,200 companies employed nearly 49,000 workers in the coal industry, directly and indirectly, producing more than 73 million tons of West Virginia valued (conservatively) at over \$4 billion in various markets.

Coal mining generated over \$168 million in severance tax revenues for West Virginia in fiscal 2021 and tens of millions of dollars in property, payroll and business taxes.

Our industry's impact remains strong and should experience increased growth as Congress recently approved a trillion-dollar bipartisan infrastructure package to modernize America's roads, bridges and other critical infrastructure. West Virginia coal will be called upon to provide the energy that will create the steel and provide the power to propel this massive, nationwide undertaking. And we are ready to meet that need, just like we have been for generations.

Some in Washington will continue to push the Green New Deal, but our Congressional delegation is working tirelessly to defend the energy industries that employ tens of thousands of West Virginians and support our state's entire economy.

While we recognize a place for intermittent energy sources, we never should trade one energy job for another, nor should we relent to government forces coercing West Virginia to do so. We are better and much smarter than that.

The state's energy industries embrace the need to employ proven, cost-effective carbon control technologies and measures to continue developing our fossil energy assets. Like U.S. Senator Joe Manchin says, we should "innovate, not eliminate." It makes little sense to eliminate our jobs and ratchet down our economy while world carbon emissions increase.

We anticipate that West Virginia will show it is possible to have a world-class energy

A 4.65% state severance tax applies to the value of coal production and coal processing along with an additional 0.35% local coal severance tax. Coal mined from qualified new underground thin-seam mines first placed in service on or after April 11, 1997, is subject to a lower state severance tax rate of 0.65% for seams with average thickness of less than 37 inches and 1.65% for seams with average thickness between 37 inches and 45 inches. Effective July 1, 2019, the state tax rate on steam coal sold directly to electric power generators is 3.95%. The state tax rate on qualified steam coal further decreases to 3.35% effective July 1, 2020 and to 2.65% effective July 1, 2021. A 2.5% state severance tax is imposed on the reclamation of coal from coal waste ponds and coal gob piles.

**The Tax Department annually receives \$35,000 in regular coal severance tax receipts and \$35,000 in regular oil and natural gas severance tax receipts to help defray the costs associated with the administration of the various local government severance tax distribution programs. In addition, beginning in Fiscal Year 2018, the Tax Department receives an administrative fee of 1.0 percent to cover its costs of administering the local coal-bed methane tax, the local waste coal severance tax and the 5 percent coal sharing severance tax allocation to producing counties. These receipts are not reflected in the net severance tax collection table.





In 1987, West Virginia enacted a severance tax on coal based on the sale price of mined coal. Of this amount, the state retains 93%. The remaining 7% is apportioned among the state's 55 coal counties and its 228 incorporated municipalities. Three-fourths (75%) of the 7% share is divided among the coal-producing counties. This money is distributed according to each county's production level. The remaining quarter (25%) of the 7% is divided among all counties and municipalities, according to population. Each county also receives an additional reallocation of severance revenues, based on the population of the unincorporated areas of the county.

Coal in our Economy: The Coal Tree


